Human Trafficking and Missing and Murdered Women

The MRS Three Planned Strategy

The two offices of the USCCB, Migrant and Refugee Services and the Subcommittee on Native American Affairs has been collaborating on a three-point strategy to raise awareness on human trafficking and the related issue of missing and murdered women.

The largest obstacle is to develop awareness and programs in a culturally responsive way. Our first priority in this project is to reach out to the Elders and other stake holders in ways we can partner to move this project forward.

The first strategy is to engage Native Catholic schools. We have developed a working relationship with the American Catholic Indian Schools Network. We will begin with the eight schools in the Network, but also expand the program to include the 20 Native Catholic schools that are not in the Network. We will begin a series of webinars on this topic in the summer of 2024 and then, depending on funding, have a week of in-person talks in D.C. in the summer of 2025.

The second strategy is to engage Native Catholic parishes. We will begin with two or three pilot parishes with a series of dialogues to find a way to adapt the material into a culturally responsive way. When we develop a program with the Indigenous leaders, we will help implement it. It is hoped that when we help develop programs through these pilot parishes, we can take the structure to other Native communities.

The third strategy is to engage Native health care workers. Most of the contact of victims first comes through the health care system. We plan to work with the Indian Health Services and the Bureau of Indian Affairs to help augment their programs and see where we can be of help, especially in the pastoral care of victims and victim's families.
